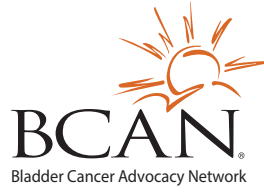
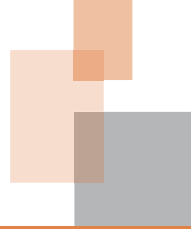


BLADDER CANCER AWARENESS QUIZ

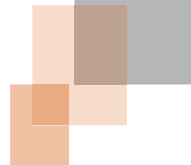
Answer the following questions to learn how much you know about the risks and warning signs of bladder cancer.

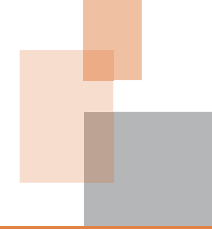
- ANSWERS**
- Bladder cancer can occur at any age but your risk increases as you age. The average age at diagnosis is 73. Men are four times more likely to develop bladder cancer than women. Yet women are often diagnosed at a later stage of bladder cancer.
 - All of these are known to increase the risk of developing bladder cancer. Learn more at www.bcan.org/ **signs-risk-factors.**
 - Caucasians are likely to develop bladder cancer as are African-Americans or Hispanics; Asians have the lowest rate of bladder cancer. African Americans are more likely to have more advanced disease when diagnosed and are twice as likely to die from the disease.
 - All of these may be signs of bladder cancer. But they may also be signs of other urinary tract diseases. Be sure to see a urologist, the doctor who specializes in diseases of the urinary organs.

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
